- ◆ Kits come with 10 copies of each title and 1 discussion guide to help start the conversation.
- ◆ Each kit is checked out for 6 weeks to ensure enough reading time. Overdue fines are 20¢ per book per day.
- ◆ Kits may be booked in advance through our Book Club Coordinator at 860-285-1925.
- ◆ We ask that the complete Book Kit be returned to the Windsor Library inside the library.
- ◆ Please check the contents of the Kit against the label tag before you return the Kit to the library.
- ◆ Looking for a title we don't own? Other libraries in our area have kits to borrow. Ask our Book Club Coordinator.
- ◆ Any other questions, please ask! We are happy to help.

- ◆ Picking up individual copies at our Main Library so each member can read at his or her own pace




All the Light We Cannot See, Anthony Doerr | Fiction
